

Sets 1 and 2

The finals would feature four essentially natural partnerships, but with Markey-Haffer playing a lot of wildness including mini no-trump and specific two-suiter openings, flimsy openings and overcalls and a host besides. Everyone present had signed a contract never to pass an 11-count and 9- and 10-counts non-vulnerable would not be off-limits.

Slam on a finesse isn't always worth writing about – but this one had a point that eluded me.

Technically slam here is worse than 50% (no one ever mentions that spades might be 5-0, hearts 5-0 or diamonds 6-1) but, in practice, it comes down to finding the diamond honours. Brake had a normal opening and bid out her shape, then co-operated once, and that was enough for Hung. Appleton led a trump, declarer drew trumps, Castellino encouraging in diamonds at his first turn. Then she ran the hearts on which Castellino pitched another diamond. That persuaded her (following Terence Reese's dictum) that the discards were more likely to be from the ace than queen so she misguessed the suit and Appleton had 13 IMPs. Nicely defended.

Barry Goren wrote to me and said that declarer SHOULD have got diamonds right. Why? Because the hand on lead had a singleton heart and didn't lead it (remember here Hung had not responded 2° so hearts were an off-suit not a bid suit). Why would you avoid the heart lead – because you know partner does not have the ace – therefore you have the •A, not partner.

Appleton picked up a second 12 IMP swing when Brake-Hung got too high on an auction where it is arguable who did too much.



Hung bid 4 - yes 4 might have simplified his partner's life but is it natural or splinter? Over 4 Brake bid 4 (slam might be cold facing a 6-4-1-2 with the right A-AK-K combination after all. Now Hung jumped to 5 and though Brake passed she now needed to find K and didn't do so - and yes, to maximize irritation, it was singleton offside.

It was Castellino's turn to have to guess an honour in a high-level contract a board later.

Board 6, Dealer East, EW vulnerable

Castellino's 3€ call looks like a considerable overbid to me, but maybe I'm missing something. Appleton was obviously expecting more but slam isn't terrible for E/W - though curiously a diamond lead prevents you from ruffing a heart. Brake led ♥K of course and shifted to a spade. Since the auction had suggested North had the long hearts declarer's line of crossing to a diamond to take the club finesse looks eminently reasonable, but unlucky. The Closed Room looked at the diamond slam but stayed safely low. That made it 25-15 to Appleton.

OK: turnabout is fair play. it was Appleton's turn to get too high, when Castellino was encouraged to take a phantom sacrifice on an auction where perhaps he should not have been encouraged to participate, and perhaps he should not have taken the plunge anyway.

Castellino held a 2-4-4-3 7-count with $extsf{-}J$, $ilde{A}$, and $ilde{Q}$. Both vulnerable, he saw his partner open 1 $ilde{}$ and when doubled he raised to 2 $ilde{}$. Brake bid 2 $ilde{A}$, Appleton 4 $ilde{}$ (hearts and clubs) and Hung 4 $ilde{}$. What now? He chose to bid 5 $ilde{}$ – which might have been right if he had been facing a singleton spade, but wasn't today when partnerhad $ilde{K}J$.

Appleton only went one down in his contract but the other room was defending and collecting 500 against his teammates in 4 • X.

The lead lasted one board, when a triumph for Markey's methods saw him overcall on a piece of manure, and then



know not to lead that suit against the opponents' confidently bid 3NT. In the other room Hung had no such warning and led his long suit, conceding the ninth trick in 3NT at once. The match score was 36-27 now after eight deals.

Finally someone bid to a good slam – but you'd have to say that the auction involved a bow and arrow rather than heat-seeking guided missiles.

Board 11, Dealer S, Nilvulnerable



In one room Hung heard Brake open 1♠ and Appleton double. He improvised with 1♠ and when Castellino jumped to 4♥ Appleton could think of nothing to say. 4♥ made 480, while in the other room a mini no-trump from Haffer saw Kaplan show one major. Then he removed

2♥ to 2NT to show extras; Brown jumped to 4♥, and when Kaplan corrected to 4♥ he tried 6♥, completing an elegant sequence to the correct spot. Those 10 IMPs saw an eventful set conclude at 38-36 to Brake.

The first deal of the second set saw Matthew Brown and Stephen Castellino each faced with the problem of whether to act over RHO's 1 opener. They held an unremarkable 3-4-4-2 13-count with the doubleton AK and (critically) not just just king-third of spades but K-8-x. Brown doubled and heard partner cuebid so tried 2NT raised to game. Partner had \oplus J-9-x and the opening lead to 3NT was the doubleton spade ten, turning a decent contract into a laydown one. Castellino passed 1 as I would have done too I must admit, and collected +200 on defence, facing a balanced hand that might have reopened with 1NT. 10 IMPs to Brake.

Sunday 9th February 2025

Broadbeach, Gold Coast

Brake picked up a further 11 IMPs a deal or two later in rather similar fashion when Hung drove to a playable 3NT game facing one of Brake's opening bids while Markey-Haffer appeared to face confusion about whether they were having a strong, weak or invitational sequence to play a part-score. It was 61-36 now for Brake, who had scored the last 36 IMPs.

But the tide turned when Brown and Kaplan's light opening bid style saw Kaplan respond 1NT to a 1 opener with a balanced 12-count. Brown simply drove to 3NT, missing a laydown club slam, duly reached by Castellino-Appleton on an inverted minor sequence.

One of the disadvantages of playing two-suited opening bids is that it sometimes seems you are obliged to make the call wheneveryou have a hand that qualifies by virtue of its shape, even if the high cards do not support that view. On the next deal Appleton opened 2 \oplus vulnerable with a decent nine-count, but \oplus 9-x-x-x-and \oplus A-Qx-x-x as well as \oplus K-x. that didn't have to be bad for his side, but Castellino had to guess whether to play 5-2 spades (holding the doubleton king in support) or look for a 5-3 or 5-4 minor suit fit, and guessed wrong. 2 \oplus went quietly down, while 3 \oplus was relatively straightforward in the other room. It was 69-50 now for Brake, but the action wasn't over.

Castellino picked up:

●AQ832 ●AQJ853 ●3 ●A

and doubled a club opener, heard a 1♥ response then basically Blackwooded his way to slam facing one keycard. Right he was. Partner had a doubleton spade with the king onside, and 12 tricks were easy. That left it with Brake leading 72-63 at the halfway mark.


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Set 3

An adjustment to the score had given Brake 4 IMPs on a deal where they had lost 2 IMPs in the second set. That will be shown now in the running scores.

The set started out with Appleton on a tear – the match has been going in phases where one team scores three or four big swings in a row...

Deal 1, Dealer North, Nil vulnerable



The set started off with a bang when Castellino-Appleton bid a slam off a cashing ace and king-ten fourth of trumps. The unopposed auction was a confusing one:

Trumps did not behave but the club ace could be discarded if it wasn't cashed – and Harrison was not going to lead a club from KQ986 on this auction. When he led a trump it not only allowed the discard it also simplified the trump position. Castellino's 3€ call with a 6-5-1-1 shape earned the swing. Appleton trailed 68-72.

Four boards later Hung and Markey faced an opening lead problem against 4♥ on essentially identical auctions, knowing declarer was strong and unbalanced.

Hung led a club and declarer shook a spade loser on dummy's ace-king, Markey led the diamond jack and Haffer won his ace and the defence then cashed three spades. Appleton led 84-72. They added a part-score swing when all four members of the Brake team could be argued to have done too much bidding on the same hand. That made it 84-73.

Suddenly, the momentum shifted to Brake, for no discernible reason except that was just how the match had been going!


Each West led a heart after hearing 1♥-2♥-4♥ on a club lead.

Declarer led a trump to dummy and a second trump as East followed up the line (maybe it is right to call for spades if playing suit preference). Appleton continued clubs. Harrison won in hand and drew the last trump, stripped off the clubs and led a diamond to the eight. Castellino, down to ♠K-9-8 and ♠A-10 was helpless. Had he kept one more diamond and pitched a spade he could at least have given declarer a guess in the ending.

Kaplan led a club and shifted to the diamond jack, covered all round. Back came a club and Haffer drew the last trump but did not take the last club before playing a second diamond. Brown could win and exit with a club, leaving declarer no recourse but the spade finesse. Down one and 12 IMPs back to Brake.

They regained the lead on a strange deal where it seemed that Markey's discretion would pay dividends.

Deal 11, Dealer South, Nil vulnerable



3NT looks nearly hopeless with the spade break so unfavourable. When Haffer opened a mini 1NT, Markey invited game via the transfer, stopping in 2NT, and Kaplan led a top diamond Haffer won and took the spade finesse, crossed to hand with a top club (blocking the suit) then repeated the finesse. Back came a spade and now, if declarer cleared spades, the defence would return a club and lock him in dummy. Haffer took his spade winner, unblocked the clubs but could only come to seven tricks. In the other room Hung opened a strong no-trump and Harrison chose to drive to game via Puppet Stayman. Castellino guessed to lead the $\bullet J$ – not a bad choice today. Hung won and took a winning spade finesse, ran four club tricks and repeated the spade finesse. Appleton had pitched an encouraging heart so Castellino shifted to one. His choice of the $\bullet 10$ was disastrous though, when Appleton ducked. Hung had one heart, two spades, four clubs and a diamond in the bank and, when he exited in hearts, all Appleton could do was win his now bare ace and give dummy the ninth trick in diamonds.

The final deal of the set saw Haffer let through a doubled game when he misread the count while cashing out on defence, and suddenly Brake led 111-90, having trailed by double digits. 12 boards to go. When would the music stop?

There were several interesting boards in the final set, though the scoreline shows as 14-10 to Brake, and Brake won the GCC Open Teams 125 to 100.1 IMPs.

A Chat with Cass

On my first journey in the tournament world, my partner Clare Filmer-Ramsay [ClareFR] and I found ourselves on table 1 in the Penline 500 section back when Canberra was held at the QT. It was 2017.

Clare and I had just learned Reverse Bergen a few weeks earlier (note to self: don't change the system right before going to your first major tournament!). So there we were on table one North-South for the last round. I opened 1S, west bid 2C and Clare bid 3D. I didn't alert it (brain fart). No one asked me what it meant (if they had, maybe I'd have clued in but alas, they didn't). Bidding came around to me and I thought, "she doesn't like my spades and she has lots of diamonds. I have 2 diamonds, so I'll just let her play in 3D" and I passed. Clare has a poker face usually and this time was no different until west passed and east led. Now I get a look from Clare that seriously would have sent shivers down the spine of the most hardened criminal!

Still I didn't have any idea it was Reverse Bergen. We went down 3 for a -4 score. This didn't cost us the match but it shook my confidence enough that it affected the rest of the boards and we lost that match by -23. It was the only match we lost. We came second. Lessons learned? You betcha!

I recognise Reverse Bergen now! I'm trying to let bad boards float away and focus on the next game. I now know one card played or not, one bid made or not ... these can cost you big time. I love the big congresses!

The thrill of being it the same room as all these fanatics, the thrill of being able to play a hand to the best of my ability, the thrill of winning a match, bettering your ranking, beating a higher ranked pair, talking bridge in the evenings ... these give me the drive to do it all again. For those of you who are curious as to what Bergen is, here is a brief description:

After a major 1 level opening:

With a 3 card fit:

- A simple 1 level raise (1H-2H or 1S-2S) = a 3 card fit, 6-9 points and/or 9 losers (more often than not you will have both the points and loser count if you have one of them).
- Skipping the next level of the other major and bidding that other major (1H-2S or 1S-3H) = 'hey partner, I have 3 of your suit and 10-12 points and/or 8 losers' (again more often than not if you have one of them, you'll have both).

With a 4 or more fit:

- 2NT = 4 card support and an opening/close to opening hand (with partnership agreement you could make this bid with a 3 card fit too. Agree with your partner if this also means you have no more than 6 losers too)
- 3C = 4+ card support and 6-9 points and/or 9 losers
- 3D = 4+ card support and 10-12 points and/or 8 losers
- 3H/3S = 4+ card fit and 6 or less points and/or 10 losers (with a fit, this is the weakest bid). Advantage is it blocks ops from finding their suit.
- 4H/4S = fit in suit and 7 losers and no interest in slam. If not vul against ops who are vul, you can have a lower point count as opposed to if the vulnerability is reversed.

Of course, this is by partnership agreement.

A Chat with Cass cont.

One advantage of it is when you bid the other major (1S-3H or 1H-2S), the opposition can't find their fit in that other major and would be hard pressed to bid a minor at a higher level.

Another advantage is the opener knows from your one bid if they're going to game, part score or seek a slam.

As I write this, I am looking forward to flying up to the Gold Coast tomorrow night for the Congress there. I still remember being so intimidated the first time I went there and saw the sea of tables, so many I could even see the end of the room.

Maybe I'll write about a winning hand or two from this Congress next month, if you want to read about it.

If there are other questions you would like answers to, ask me. If I don't know the answer, I will find someone who does.

Until then though, it doesn't matter where you play, it matters THAT you play. My only goal as a director is that my players enjoyed their games.
